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
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

ince 1990, Deschutes Children's Foundation (DCF) has provided the space and support where nonprofits succeed at helping children and families. DCF is the literal foundation for community staples such as KIDS Center, MountainStar, Saving Grace, FAN, CASA of Central Oregon, and many more. In support of DCF's vital mission, the organization hosts its largest fundraiser, the Ripples Gala each year. Funds raised from Ripples enable DCF to carry out its mission, remain a cornerstone of 20 child-and-family serving nonprofits, and a hub for a wide spectrum of human services from abuse prevention and advocacy to early childhood development. One highlight of the Ripples Gala is the long-held tradition of featuring a local artist whose specially selected artwork will be auctioned off the night of the event. This year, DCF is honored to feature Stephen Teater and his painting, Fort Rock, Flower Moon.

Stephen's Biography:

My hope is to visually communicate with others, to touch the collective subconscious and form a connection along the human condition, in its beauty and ugliness, its light and dark, its joy and fear. Playfully and provocatively, I question the obvious and unquestioned. I aim to arouse empathy for one's self and others, responsibility for the world we inherited and the one we're making; to challenge beliefs, traditions and unconscious behavior; to recognize our roles in life as either agents of good or evil. I intend my artworks to function as both intriguing objects of beauty and as mirrors, inspiring questions, self-awareness, openmindedness, independent thinking, and a deeper understanding of our shared humanity.

As a child, drawing was my way to capture what I admired, escape to distant or imaginary places, inhabit the archetypes of my favorite fairytales, books and movies, and don the personas of my heroes. Drawings were interpretations, meditations, dreams, souvenirs, gifts, jokes, and artifacts: my means of parsing and understanding the world around me; exploring ideas, memories, relationships, beliefs and experiences; expressing emotions and communicating fantasies, perceptions and ideals; and for telling stories: my stories; the human story.

I grew up in Bend, and my wife Jenny and I have explored many special places in Oregon and, at least once every year since we met, we have returned to Fort Rock to visit the ancient, spiritual awareness that lingers and watches over that place: an invisible, creative, quiet and powerful observer. Its apparently barren landscape harbors a vibrant and robust ecosystem, and Fort Rock is itself alive: it vibrates and offers a truly sublime experience of Man's impermanence and insignificance within nature and in the face of natural and cosmic forces. My love and awe for this place, and the time and memories made here were my inspiration when painting *Fort Rock, Flower Moon*.

It is my honor and privilege to contribute my artwork to the mission of the Deschutes Children's Foundation. My blessed role in life as an artist bears the power and responsibility of giving back in service and love and compassion to my fellows. For my own daughter, I am the example of my values and beliefs and what constitutes right thought and action. As the child of a loving and imperfect family, I see no greater good to support, no better way to address the troubles and struggles in our societies and cultures, than to care for, provide for, protect, nurture, guide, encourage and love our children. To do so can heal and reconnect us to the child within us all: that honest, vulnerable, innocent, wonderful, wise, curious, hopeful, faithful us that believes we are all family and that the world can be a safe and good place for everybody — that it should be — and that we all have the power and agency to make it so. I am fond of saying, "My actions ripple outwards and eventually return. What kind of waves am I making?"

Continuing through April 28 is the story of the town of Maxville and its people through *Timber Culture*, a traveling photography exhibition curated by the Maxville Heritage Interpretive Center in Joseph, Oregon. The Maxville Heritage Interpretive

Center highlights the cultural history of the area by collecting, interpreting and preserving the history of Maxville and similar logging communities across the West.

Although *Timber Culture* is a traveling exhibition, the Museum's exhibitions team added their own special touches. The exhibit features historic objects from the Museum's collection illustrating everyday life in the era as well as a few hands-on interactives for kids like a wash basin with wash boards and a cross section of a massive old growth ponderosa pine tree.

The *Endangered in The High Desert* exhibit continues through July 7, bringing heightened attention to the variety of species in the High Desert ecosystem that are facing extinction or recovering from the threat. Examine the importance of ecological connectivity through engaging photographs and playful design. Visitors will also learn about simple conservation measures that they can take to help wildlife. In addition to learning about endangered species in the exhibit, visitors can tour the High Desert Museum's other exhibits to meet living wildlife that have been listed on the ESA, including a bald eagle, Foskett speckled dace and desert tortoises.

And continuing through January 12, 2025 is *Sensing Sasquatch*. Leave your pop-culture notions behind as you learn about the past, present and future of Sasquatch through the work of five Native artists. See their representations, stories and artwork about this "non-human other" and learn how they vary between tribes across regions in this High Desert Museum original exhibition.

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





Red Chair Gallery Presents Deb Borine ~ Fused Glass

eb Borine's fused glass bowls pulsate with rich color and her glass "landscapes" shimmer with painterly trees and sunsets. She has been working with glass for nearly 20 years and still manages to come up with fresh ideas for her creations. Her work is on display at Red Chair Gallery.

Recently, she has been incorporating dichroic glass into her work in new ways. Dichroic glass can display as multiple different colors depending on lighting conditions. In the bowl pictured here, Borine employs it on a transparent blue glass background to create a contrasting opaque design with a slightly glittery look.

Years ago, she started making flat glass panels on which she designed landscapes with tree branches, leaves and sunsets. She cuts the tree shapes out of glass sheets and then applies layers of frit (ground glass ranging from powder to coarse) to make the leaves and sunset streaks before fusing the whole thing. Now she has elevated the landscape concept into making bowls. To start, she cuts a piece of glass into a large circle like a rolled-out piecrust. After applying the flat glass tree trunks and branches, she layers on the frit to complete the design. This flat piece is fired and flipped to the other side, where she applies the design for the other side. Now it looks like a loaded pizza and she fires it again. Then the whole piece is slumped or draped into a bowl mold and fired another three or four times to get a steep sided bowl.

Fusing glass requires a thorough understanding of



the temperature ranges required for glass to go from its original cold state to molten and then cooling and annealing the glass back into its cold state once more. Different types of glass have different coefficients of expansion (COE) when heated. The COE is the ratio of the increase in expansion of the glass as it rises in temperature and in the way it shrinks as it cools. Both pieces of glass must cool at the same rate. If you are fusing two types of glass with different COEs, the result will be a weakened piece of glass that is prone to breaking or shattering if it even survives the fusing process, Borine explains.

If you are fusing two different colors together, you must consider the potential chemical reactions of these two glasses when in molten form. Elements and metals like copper, selenium, sulfur, silver,



aluminum or gold are used to create the colors of the glass. The artist must know how they might react when fused together, she notes.

So-called "striker" glass will change color radically upon firing so the artist needs to understand this concept, as the result could be a surprise or unanticipated color, she warns. These principles are only a few of the many rules of glass-making that an artist needs to master.

A typical firing takes 12-14 hours and Borine's computerized kiln carefully regulates the heat to prevent thermal shock as the temperature slowly

rises to 1,480 degrees (a full fuse) and then gradually decreases during the annealing process on the way down. The thicker the glass, the longer the firing takes. Her simple, but elegant, olive oil and vinegar garlic plates require three firings: one to create the base, one for the added frit, and the last to slump the piece in a mold. Usually, she can only fire one large piece at a time, unlike ceramic artists who can often fire many pieces at once. It's a laborious process but it results in brilliant glass creations.

A Bend resident since 1978, Borine always had a creative bent and worked with many art forms, including stained glass, basket weaving, quilting, fiber art, metal art and jewelry. But nothing captivated her more than fused glass. "Once I found kilnformed glass, that was it for me," she says.

She started taking glass-making classes in 2007 from Kate McLeod, who owned Glass Symphony, an art glass gallery on Wall Street. The landlord asked McLeod to design a stained glass panel to insert above the front door, which she made with Borine's collaboration. You can still see it at 916 NW Wall Street, although the space is occupied by another business.

Borine also established and managed a glass guild for ten years and taught fused glass classes at Central Oregon Community College for eight years and now offers private lessons at her studio. She has been a member of Red Chair Gallery since it opened 15 years ago. Besides exhibiting her work there, she is also available to make customer pieces.

Celebrating Three Decades of

Creativity & Collaboration

hat begins as a simple lump of earth, mixed with water, meets air and fire, at the hands of the artist/craftsperson becomes a vibrant vessel or stunning wall hanging. It can be made on the pottery wheel or built "by hand," or sculpted. The possibilities reach as far as the artist's imagination.

The Raku Club of Central Oregon (RACO) originated three decades ago with a group of hobby potters intrigued with the Raku firing process. The spectacular process involves pulling a glowing red-hot pot from the kiln and placing it into a container of combustibles such as dry leaves or paper. The result produces the distinctive raku crackle finish, often with metallic colors or embellished with carbon trailings of horse hair or feathers. RACO has since evolved to include the wide-ranging work of many members of the Bend pottery community, and includes everything from decorative pieces to whimsey to pottery for daily use, in colors that can range from earthy to bright and colorful.

The members of the group are as varied as the work they produce. It is no longer just a hobbyist group. The club now includes professional artists, clay instructors and skilled recreational potters. They come from disparate backgrounds, but with a common passion for clay. Among them:

Diane Miyauchi, a retired art teacher, specializes in useful forms for everyday living in her signature blue and green splash glazes: platters, mugs, bowls and more.

Alan Werkman, a clinical psychologist, and active potter for 30 years creates stunning earth-toned vases, cups and bowls.

Helen Bommarito, with art degrees from the universities of Washington and Texas, teaches pottery classes for adults and kids at Bend Parks and Rec and COCC. Her work is as diverse as her students: tableware, utilitarian, sculptural or whimsical pieces.



Moe Carolin, head of the Ceramics department at COCC brings colorfully decorated mugs, trays, vases and more.

Peter Roussel, a former building contractor with an art major from San Francisco State U led an art program for autistic children in Mendocino California. His recent work focuses on the "crawl" glazed surface that separates into patterns when fired in the kiln.

Susan Yokoyama, retired nurse dedicated to furthering her fine skills in ceramics.

Alex Gnefkow, head ceramics technician at COCC creates contemporary decorated functional ware.

With a combined 200 years of experience in clay and in life, they come together to compliment and inspire one another.

The group's work will be on show and sale April 27 and 28 at the Environmental Center, 16 NW Kansas Ave, Bend.



The Power of Music


SAKURA Cellist Yoshika Masuda

n Friday, April 12, High Desert Chamber Music's 16th season will continue with the Central Oregon debut of Sakura Cello Quintet. We had the opportunity to speak with Yoshika (Yoshi) Masuda, co-founder and cellist in Sakura, about his love of the cello, his history with the group, and his love of chamber music.

Yoshi was born in Japan, where his father was an amateur jazz musician. Yoshi and his friends would often go see his dad perform at the local jazz clubs where he would always go up on stage to try to pluck a string (sometimes midperformance!). His dad took this as a sign and handed him a cello on his fifth birthday... and the rest is history!

Around the age of 12, Yoshi and family moved from Japan to Australia. While the approach to music education was quite a bit different, Japan and Australia offered something unique. Yoshi recalls that "building a dependable foundation was a focus of my lessons when I was in Japan, but in general, I felt the education in Australia allowed me to be more free with my expression. I feel I got the best of both worlds."

While Yoshi has had a rewarding career as both a soloist and a chamber musician, chamber music is really where the joy in music-making lies for him. "I play in many groups but there's nothing like making music intimately with musicians you respect." The Sakura Cello Quintet was formed while all the members were students at USC. They wanted to form a cello ensemble that worked as seriously by PHIL MACHONIS



as any traditional string ensemble. According to Yoshi, "Everyone brings something unique to the table. All the members are great artists so performing as an ensemble is very inspiring."

Like most musicians, it is difficult for Yoshi to pinpoint specific repertoire that is his favorite. The romantics like Schumann and Brahms really appeal to him, but if he had to pick a "desert island disc," it would be Bach. When asked whether he had a particular piece that he held in high regard, Yoshi told me about playing Bruch's Kol Nidrei. While he was learning the piece, he was visiting a friend's daughter in the hospital who had lost her ability to speak and move. He played the piece and afterward, while she couldn't speak, a single tear rolled down her cheek. "She expressed her appreciation for the music in the only way she could - with that single teardrop. This was the moment I realized the power of music and the effect it could have on others. If I could evoke any kind of emotions through my music, then that is the single greatest compliment a musician can ever receive."




ETC to Tour Poignant
