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




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Mockingbird's

One Man Show

Dan Chen Celebrates the Natural World through Sculpting & More

he renowned Mockingbird Gallery, an artistic and creative staple among the downtown Bend businesses, is hosting a unique showing that aims to celebrate our natural world in a variety of mediums.

From July 5 to July 31, the gallery will host *Reflections & New Beginnings*, a showing by the bronze sculptor Dan Chen.

Mockingbird Gallery was opened in 1990 by the woman who now owns the Rimrock Gallery in Prineville, Pamela Claffin. In 2007, Pamela sold the gallery to its current owners, the husbandand-wife-duo Jim and Nathalie Peterson.

"After spending 19 years learning the art business in Scottsdale, Arizona, we were very fortunate to receive the opportunity to bring that experience to Bend," Jim said. "We've watched our children grow up in this amazing city and we've also expanded the business by opening the Peterson Contemporary Art Gallery in the Franklin Crossing building on Bond Street about seven years ago."

Artist Dan Chen has been with the Mockingbird Gallery almost as long as Jim and Nathalie have owned it, "Dan started with Mockingbird about two years after we took ownership, so I believe we've worked together for 15 or 16 years now," Jim said. "He is such an amazing person to work with. He has so much joy in what he does and manages to stay humble throughout the process."

Jim said that Dan is one of the most celebrated artists at the gallery. What sets this showing apart is the fact that Dan is putting on a one-man show that involves a vast array of artistic mediums.

"Dan is very well known for his limited edition, lost wax bronze castings depicting wildlife and animal subjects. A lot of his sculpture collectors are not aware of how many other mediums he has mastered, so we have wanted to create a show focusing on the various mediums for quite some time," Jim said. "Not only will we have a great variety of his bronze sculptures on display, but we will also have his watercolors on silk, pastel works, enamel on porcelain, raku pottery, fused glass and lucite engravings. It will be a fantastic celebration of all his many talents, together on display for the first time at Mockingbird Gallery."

To Dan, this unique opportunity is not one he wanted to squander, "About two years ago Jim offered me this opportunity to have a one-person show. He basically gave me a blank canvas, it was up to me to do what I wanted with the show. That's extremely unusual!" Dan said. "I am grateful for the opportunity to tell my story and the path I have walked as an artist. It's not very often a gallery would allow an artist this kind of freedom! Most artists are working in many different mediums, but not too many have such a chance to be able to showcase them. I am extremely fortunate."


The show will feature many pieces by Dan, including *Springtime* which is Chinese watercolor on silk. Dan said that this piece, and many others in the show, were made to represent different times in his life when each respective medium was his primary focus.

Dan says that behind every piece, he is driven by a deep love of nature and the natural world, drawing inspiration from the flora and fauna around him.

Jim said that while this show is part of a larger network of showings, there is a possibility that Bend will get another Dan Chen solo-show in the future. "We currently have 12 shows annually between our two downtown galleries that open on each First Friday, and with nearly 90 artists represented, we are fortunate to have many different features and themes to each exhibition," Jim said. "We may end up creating another one-person show for Dan Chen in the future, but for now we are concentrating on building a strong series of exhibitions in 2025. We'll see what the future holds!"

simple conservation measures that they can take to help wildlife. In addition to learning about endangered species in the exhibit, visitors can tour the High Desert Museum's other exhibits to meet living wildlife that have been listed on the ESA, including a bald eagle, Foskett speckled dace and desert tortoises.

Continuing through September 8 is the artwork of Ann Hamilton, Matthew Day Jackson, Wangechi Mutu and Kiki Smith, *Near, Far, Gone: From the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and his Family Foundation*, the Museum's most recent exhibit, explores the close and complex relationship between humans and wildlife. urals have become a landmark in Central Oregon; one can travel from city to city, across county lines, and find colorful murals created by local artists that tell a story about the place they are from.

Bend's list of murals made by local artists can grow a bit longer, thanks to a campaign by the nationwide footwear retailer, Famous Footwear. "Make it FAMOUS" is a new campaign aimed at supporting local artists and adding touches of individuality to a nationwide chain.

Here in Bend, the campaign saw two local artists selected for the task: Katie Daisy and Karen Eland. According to a statement released by Famous Footwear via Refine PR, "Katie Daisy, a renowned illustrator and author, infuses her work with the magic of nature, reflecting her upbringing in rural Illinois. Together, they will create a captivating tapestry of native flora, fauna, and iconic footwear, offering viewers a visual feast that celebrates the region's rich heritage."

This is not the first time that artists Katie and Karen have collaborated to bring some beauty to Bend's walls; the duo has actually worked together on nearly 20 different murals. According to Karen, "My realistic animals often interact with Katie's more whimsical and larger scale flowers and lettering."

Together, the duo has made something special; a piece of art that draws in the eye and teaches any passerby a thing or two about the region, should they pay enough attention. "We really wanted to garner a sense of place, which is why every species on the mural is entirely intentional," Katie said. "All of the flora and fauna, from the birds and butterflies to the wildflowers, are all specific local species."

The two artists are grateful for the opportunity to do something they love in a new way, "This is our first time painting onto vinyl that's been put over a window, and so far we like it!" Karen said. "The surface is very smooth and allows the paint to go on quickly. It is a little challenging going carefully around each window frame, but I think it will look cool in the end. The mural can be easily removed whenever the time comes, so I think this is a good solution for businesses without wall space to devote to murals."

"We're thrilled to partner with local artists like Katie Daisy and Karen Eland to bring art to our storefronts," says Holly Campbell, Senior Vice President of Marketing at Famous Footwear. "This project not only supports the arts but also adds vibrancy to our community spaces, inviting everyone to experience the joy of creativity."

Holly says that the idea came about due to Famous Footwear's belief in being part of and supporting the local communities they exist in. This campaign helps a nationwide brand like Famous Footwear localize itself by allowing the storefront to artistically represent the region.

Holly added that she is most excited to see each artist's individuality pop out of the mural, "We are most excited to see how local artists express their individuality through murals on our stores, seeing their unique point of view come through very differently for the same task and opportunity. We love how Katie Daisy has incorporated shoes into the mural in a style that feels so authentic to her style and the community."

For Famous Footwear, this mural represents their commitment to supporting the individuality and creativity of the communities they occupy. For Bend, the mural represents local interests, the appreciation for our local flora and fauna, and of course, the notion that exploring the great outdoors requires the right pair of shoes.

The mural is up now for the foreseeable future for all to enjoy, at the Famous Footwear in the Cascade Village Shopping Center.

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Red Chair Gallery Presents


Mary Moore Ceramic Sculpture

mong Pablo Picasso's memorable quotes is this one: "Everything you can imagine is real." A vivid imagination inspires Mary Moore to create ceramic sculpture that transports the viewer to mythical worlds. It's a place where human figures have animal heads, wizards or jesters sport medieval headgear, and sprites in flowing gowns whisper to us. Her whimsical sculpture is on display at Red Chair Gallery.

Moore is inspired by Aesop's Fables, fairy and folk tales and Native American images. One piece shows two human figures sitting together but their bodies are topped with the heads of a lion and a lamb, evoking the theme of the Peaceable Kingdom. Tweedledee and Tweedledum, the corpulent twins from Alice in Wonderland, pose on a box, ready to ask "How do you do?" The gowned "whisperer" figures are based on Native American beliefs that "everyone has an internal voice that leads, guides and heals that person." Moore explains.

Signature touches to the figures include articulated arms that can change position and a distinctive black and white checkerboard pattern that Moore uses on clothing, boots, and pedestals. She calls her latest series of figures

From the Stars. Looking at the stars at night makes her think that humans are made of stardust, too. "My forms are based on us being out there in the universe," she explains.

There were seven children in Moore's family and they moved all over Oregon and Idaho as their banker father climbed the corporate ladder. As a child, she loved to draw animals but didn't have a lot of art materials. In high school, she enrolled in the only art class, which changed her life. "Making art was liberating and fun," she remembers. "Nothing was wrong or right in this class and I was hooked." She blended her love of art and the need to find a profession by attaining a masters in art therapy. "Art became a way of seeing the unspoken struggles and understanding emotional conflicts of others." After years of working with clients, she realized "it was time to let go and move forward on my own journey."

Moore chose clay as her medium and taught herself all the skills and techniques that have made her successful. After she forms the clay into components for her figures, she bisque fires them. She uses a copper wash to highlight certain areas. Then she paints them, applies an under glaze to make them shiny and fires them again. Although she has been a clay artist for many years, she admits that "a lot of my big pieces are trial and error."

Moore and her husband moved from Portland to Bend six years ago when they retired. She also exhibits at the Sisters Gallery & Frame Shop and Artists' Gallery Sunriver. She has shown her work at the Guardino Gallery in Portland. She welcomes custom projects, especially if they involve dogs.

National Traveling Exhibition,

Portraits in Red: Missing & Murdered Indigenous People Painting Project,

to Open at The Museum at Warm Springs June 5

ortraits in Red: Missing & Murdered Indigenous People Painting Project — a national traveling exhibition — will be on view at The Museum at Warm Springs from Wednesday, June 5 through Saturday, September 7, 2024. The exhibition features 40 paintings by Nayana LaFond (Anishinaabe, Abenaki, Mi'kmaq, French and German descent) focusing on missing and murdered Indigenous relatives.

The public is invited to the opening reception on Wednesday, June 5, from 5:30-7:30pm. Light refreshments will be served.

Behind each of the paintings is the voice of an Indigenous person who has suffered the impact of violence. Ninetyeight percent of Native people experience violence during their lifetime. Native women face murder rates 11 times the national average. These crimes are under-reported by the media and under-prosecuted by law enforcement. LaFond's project brings visibility to this ongoing crisis.

LaFond's painting project began in 2020 with one painting, Lauraina in RED,

created for the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Native Women and Girls, which is observed on May 5 and now known as Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day. Since 2020 she's painted more than 50 commissioned portraits. As of February 2024, there were 110 completed paintings. Every portrait is of someone who is missing, was murdered, survived, a family member or friend, or an activist/hero fighting for the cause. LaFond hopes to make sure the missing and dead are never forgotten, to raise awareness about this serious issue, and to provide help with healing to the families.

LaFond is a full-time multidisciplinary artist and activist who resides with her child in Western Massachusetts. She attended Greenfield Community College for Fine Art and Massachusetts College of Art for Photography



and then dropped out to become a full-time painter. Her paintings and sculptures can be seen in galleries and museums around world. Her project, Missing & Murdered Indigenous People Painting Project, has gained her international acclaim and is currently on display in museums around North America, including a Pacific Northwest Coast tour, a tour through the Institute of American Indian Studies Museum and more. LaFond has also been a curator and community arts organizer for more than 20 years, including serving as the former founding chief

curator for The Whitney Center for the Arts (Pittsfield, Mass.). She also sits on the boards of several arts organizations, including as executive board member of Artist Organized Art in New York City. Nayana is a citizen of the Métis Nation of Ontario, Canada.




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




SageBrushers Art Society of Bend Presents All-Pastel Exhibit Unapologetically Pastel

napologetically Pastel will be featured during the month of June at the SageBrushers Gallery in the Southwest Crossing neighborhood of Bend. Over 40 paintings will be on display, created by 19 artists.

Show organizer Barbara Alford shares that the pastel medium originated before oil paints. With technical advances over the centuries, the glorious pigments that have been developed would make the Old Masters envious. The core group of SageBrusher pastel artists calls themselves "The Dusty Dames and Dudes." Barbara says they are "unapologetically in love with our pastels." "We love the tactile feel, the forgiveness and the rich/ juicy colors of the pastel medium," said Barbara. "We even have specialized vocabulary and tools — 'sticks' of pigment are our paintbrushes and sanded paper is our canvas. Our creative toolbox includes



'stumps', and rubbing alcohol, with blending tools of PVC pipe insulation and even our own fingers."

Artist Laura Fouts has been painting in pastels for about five years. Laura finds that pastel brings the freedom to express how she sees nature. She especially loves to paint clouds and desert landscapes with their unique shapes and textures. As Laura explains, "Pastel gives the artist a very tactile experience as the artist is directly putting pigment onto the paper instead of through a brush or palette knife. While working on a painting it is easy to get lost in the mark making giving the artist



the opportunity to shut out the noise around them and get engrossed in the process."

Artist John Sherry is a contributor to the show. Sherry is a Signature Member of the Pastel Society of America and enjoys the challenge of making the mundane appear interesting through art. His current body of work leans toward still-life imagery with railroad settings a recurring theme.

Introducing Local Artist Steven M. Post

y interest in art began when I was around seven to eight years old. My great grandfather, Charles W. Post, made a living painting (and selling goat's milk) in the Columbia River corridor near Crown Point Point Vista House and Multnomah Falls. I admired his oil paintings that hung in the "farm-style" home that he and my grandfather, Frank Post, built near Corbett, Oregon. Charles' mediums were oil, watercolor, pen and ink and etchings.

I began pencil sketching at around age eight. And when I was in the fifth grade at age 11, my teacher let me draw instead of taking shop (I had no desire to build birdhouses and make ashtrays). I didn't try watercolor until I was a junior at OSU. My first watercolor painting of a horse, fence and barn looked like a kindergartner's finger painting! But by the end of the term I did receive an A.

After college, I put painting aside until about 20 years later. I took a class from art instructor Winnie Givet of Sisters. I learned so very much from her (thank you Winnie!) and since then my art has been displayed in the annual Labor Day two-day art show at Black Butte Ranch for four to five years, and around 60 people have my

art hanging in their vacation homes at Black Butte Ranch.

I then put my art aside until about 2016, when I took a watercolor class from art instructor Jodie Scheider (also from near Sisters). I also learned so much from her (thanks Jodie!).

About three years ago, and quite by happenstance, my cousin Jeff Terril asked me if I could paint his daughter's dog. I had never painted animals before, but I said I'd try. Fortunately, she liked the painting and to this day uses it as her screensaver. Then Cousin Jeff asked me to paint his other daughter's two dogs. She also loved the art. My brother then asked me to paint his significant other's dog... and then...

To date, I've completed around 50 pet and wildlife portraits... mostly word-ofmouth referrals — I paint more for relaxation and pleasure than for commissions. Painting is a way for me to release stress and to relax for several hours — and escape my challenges in life. I sometimes paint out in nature, in a forest by a babbling brook or in the high desert with the views of our beautiful snow-capped




mountains, and to escape interruptions at home in my little studio.
















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Classical Music in the Wild Announces Ninth Season

unter Noack, classical pianist and naturalist will travel with a nine-foot Steinway grand piano across the American West and Canada for 50 concerts in the 9th season of the ground-breaking classical series IN A LANDSCAPE: Classical Music in the Wild. Mountain tops, old growth forests, and sunny meadows replace the traditional concert hall in this series as audiences listen through wireless headphones, wandering afield with the music as a soundtrack to their experience.

Founded in 2016 by Noack, IN A LANDSCAPE operates with a mission to remove barriers to live classical music and to the outdoors. The series partners with national and state parks, with land trusts, conservancies, historical societies, Native American reservations and schools to share live classical music experiences, most often in rural communities where such opportunities are scarce. The series has to date presented 249 concerts featuring 110 guest artists for 50,000 people, many of whom experienced live classical music for the first time. Through the Good Neighbor Program and the intent to make the concerts accessible to all, IN A LANDSCAPE subsidizes ticket pricing at 95% of the concerts, and provides free tickets to locals directly and through partner organizations, distributing over \$100,000 in free tickets last year alone. Through the benefit concert program, IN A LANDSCAPE grants money — \$114,000 in 2023 — to school music classes, tribal initiatives, rural fire departments, land trusts, and other nonprofit community groups.

With music in magical landscapes, Noack brings together a wide crosssection of people who would otherwise rarely be sharing a concert experience. Cowboys, city folk, children, hipsters, and matrons flock from cities and deserts alike to hear Noack perform. Noack also collaborates with guest artists who are atypical of traditional classical concerts, including poets, Native American musicians, dancers, singers, and visual artists. IN A LANDSCAPE has won multiple awards and has been featured on CBS *This Morning*, in the *Los Ageles Times* and as part of TEDxPortland.

Noack's nonprofit concert series is named for the piece *In a Landscape* by John Cage. Cage, like other post-war avant garde composers, challenged listeners to reconsider what 'music' is and asked us to consider all noise — and its absence — as music. "My challenge is to reconsider the environment in which we experience art and life," says Noack.

titled What's Up? and treats the viewer to a close in look into the eyes of a cute baby deer. Lay's delicate touch is evident in her use of beautiful watercolor glazes and the glow created by her use of translucent paint.

Long time Gallery artist, potter Peter Roussel started working with clay in the mid-





1960s. Although his initial training was in traditional utilitarian pottery and traditional stoneware glazes, his work with children became a turning point in his experience as a potter — an experience that he finds difficult to put into words. He was, however, affected by creative children in the best of ways! The potter now exclusively uses alternative firing techniques to finish all his work. Each piece is a blank canvas, and each surface treatment is unique unto itself. Just like nature, Roussel produces pieces that are a range of light to dark rich blues using copper sulfate in the firing process. Raku, pit, sagger, and smoke firing along with ferric chloride are wrapped in aluminum foil and fired to different temperatures to bring out distinct colors. When everything cools down nature's serendipity is revealed.

Photographer Carolyn Waissman says that photography melds her love of nature and art. It also provides a great reason to be outside in fantastic places like Central Oregon, North America or Europe, or Africa, or well, apparently anywhere in the world! Waissman's Wildlife Portraits series is a close-up intimate portrait of the essence and attitude of each animal.
