# Sisters Folk Festival is Back

with 33 Powerful Artists from Around the World Sisters Folk Festival (SFF) returns to charming Sisters with another diverse lineup of performing artists including folk legends like Aoife O'Donovan, Hawktail, Chris Smither, The Mammals, and Väsen. The annual music festival takes place in downtown Sisters, Oregon on Friday, September 27 through Sunday, September 29.

For more than 25 years, SFF Presents has proudly produced this eclectic, multi-genre festival presenting a mix of world music, jazz, blues, bluegrass, and traditional folk for a unique listening experience with something for everyone to enjoy. Artists perform at intimate venues including expansive tents, a historic church, and courtyard patio stages at local restaurants.

The seven downtown venues range in atmosphere and capacity and include Sisters Art Works, The Belfry, The Depot, Open Door, Sisters Saloon, Oliver Lemon's, and Village Green.

Patrons of the long-running music festival can expect to feel the warmth of community, the thrill of discovery, and the joy of live music in its purest form. Designed with the listening experience in mind, this is a transformative festival experience with world-class production in a laid-back community setting.

"The Sisters Folk Festival is a deep cultural and social experience. We curate the music to amplify the community vibe of Sisters while celebrating various forms of cultural expression. This year we have bands representing music from Spain, West Africa, Sweden, Venezuela, and many strands of American roots music traditions. Each year is different and unique and this year will surely deliver," says SFF Presents creative director Brad Tisdel.

Community members are encouraged to attend the third annual free, family-friendly KidZone at Fir Street Park on Saturday, September 28. The SFF KidZone celebrates community connecting through creativity and features live musical performances, Smokey Bear, puppet making, and interactive art activities. Enjoy kid-friendly live music from Dennis McGregor, Ant Ants Ants, The Pairs, Cory Strop, a Community Dance with Scandalous Chutney, and a salsa dance with the Venezuelan band Las Guaracheras. All ages are welcome, children under the age of 12 must be accompanied by an adult.

On Sunday, September 29, the public is invited to enjoy a second free offering at SFF's longstanding Sisters Community Celebration at Village Green at 10am. Led by local singersongwriter and poet Beth Wood, the celebration includes performances from multiple festival performers and traditionally ends in a rousing, collaborative finale. Many loyal attendees lovingly refer to the celebration as "church".

SFF Presents, the nonprofit organization behind Sisters Folk Festival, Big Ponderoo and more, works to strengthen the community by centering the arts as an economic driver and foundational centerpiece of Sisters and Central Oregon. The festival is the organization's largest fundraiser of the year and supports year-round art and music education programming in the Sisters community and beyond, including educational outreach programs at all three Sisters public schools, summer creativity camps for youth at Sisters Art Works, the Americana Song Academy, and art and music classes for adults. 

"I'm a narrative painter, fascinated by doppelgängers," Bullwinkel, formerly of Bend, said of her central theme. "Folklore tells us everyone has a 'double-goer,' a mysterious, identical copy, both familiar and strange, suggesting the possibility of multiple universes where infinite versions of one's life play out simultaneously."

A former fashion and entertainment photographer — who captured icons like Kate Moss, Sinead O'Connor, Lenny Kravitz and Morgan Freeman — Bullwinkel made a switch to oil canvases and has led an extensive career as a fine artist for over 20 years, with a style that explores dream-like scenes and imagery. She taught art and photography at COCC for a number of years.



Bullwinkel has been featured on OPB's Oregon Art Beat, held artist residencies in settings as diverse as Vermont and Portugal, earned a fellowship from the Ford Family Foundation and received grant backing from the Oregon Arts Commission. She received a bachelor's degree in English Literature with a minor in painting from the University of California, Berkeley, and a master's degree in art education with a minor in painting at Montclair State University.

artwork of Ann Hamilton, Matthew Day Jackson, Wangechi Mutu and Kiki Smith, *Near, Far, Gone: From the Collections of Jordan D. 



## Red Chair Gallery Presents Tampy McCullough Soft Sculpture Fiber Artist

ammy McCullough's soft sculptures depict animals that live in Central Oregon: owls and foxes in forests, alpacas on ranches and our ubiquitous dogs that seem to be everywhere. "I love making whimsical things from nature," she says. She also derives inspirations from old song lyrics, vintage notecards and poems. One of her newer creations is of a small bunny catching stars. The song "Catch a falling star and put it in your pocket" sparked her imagination so she shaped a one-of-a-kind vignette. It would be perfect on a child's dresser.

McCullough creates her pieces by first forming a basic animal structure with wire and then felting layers of fibers over it with a barbed needle. The first layer of core wool fiber wraps the structure securely; for the second layer, she fashions muscle shapes with more core fiber. All this is then topped with a finishing blend of merino, alpaca, or other specialty fibers in appropriate colors.

Expressive eyes and mouths are tiny felted pieces of wool needled into the faces. "My animals come to life when I do the eyes," she notes. "It gives me immense satisfaction when one of my pieces sells because I know it spoke to that person."

Lately, she has been experimenting with adding feathers and beads into her figures. She

clandestinely used feathers from her husband's fly-tying supplies to enhance an owl and sewed individual beads onto the body and wings of a raven to add a bit of iridescent enchantment. On hikes, she also collects natural elements, such as rocks and small gnarled branches that can serve as part of the base of a sculpture.

McCullough is largely self-taught as an artist. In 2005, she and her family moved to Bend after living for many years in Pendleton. She had dabbled over the years in crafts including stained glass and



quilting. One day she came across some photos of soft sculpture felting and decided to give it a try with a beginner kit purchased online. She has taken online tutorials and classes with established fiber sculptors as far away as Maine and New Zealand.

McCullough buys most of her materials — wool roving, batts, and locks — online but is finding some local sources such as Crescent Moon Alpaca Ranch in Terrebonne, where she obtains alpaca fiber. She often washes, dries and cards the materials herself



before she even begins a project. She hand-blends dyed pieces of fiber to get just the right color for an animal's coat.

Besides her animal figures, she also makes photo/ business card holders that are perfect for a desktop and bookmarks that feature a rabbit with adjustable ears and head perched on a carrot. "I like unique things that can be functional too" she says. A pair of entwined foxes with heads bent together is meant to be used as a wedding cake topper. It's a distinctive piece of art McCullough hopes it will become a family heirloom to be passed on.

She listens to music or podcasts while she works, occasionally indulges in some dark chocolate and is watched over by her cat, Miss Willoughby. She usually has several projects going at once. "When I reach a rough spot with one, I put it aside and pick up another one," she explains. "My studio is always a merry, messy mayhem."

# Red Chair Gallery

## Ringing in Their 15th Year in Bend

he Red Chair Gallery, located in Downtown Bend on Northwest Oregon Avenue, is celebrating their 15th year of business, and being part of the Bend community. The gallery is owned and managed by Rita Dunlavy, a tile and mosaic artist, herself.

Rita recounted the story of how the Red Chair Gallery was founded, talking about how a group of artists who had lost their display space at Mirror Pond Gallery, and brainstormed the idea of starting a new gallery. "A couple of the artists in that group knew me as an instructor at the Art Station who was also retired from public accounting and thought I might be able to give a little guidance about how the structure might work," she said. "They seemed dedicated to having a home for emerging artists and I didn't have to think too long about it."

Rita and the group of artists came across an address, the current one they use today, and decided it would be perfect; huge glass windows and a very tall ceiling make it ideal to display art of any shape or size. "If a small group of artists were willing to invest their own money and time, it would be worth trying to build it," Rita said. "There were originally six partners, including myself. We all put in the cash to do the build outs and everyone took responsibility for the business tasks that most suited each of us."

Overtime, the artists learned that pursuing their art career and running their business-oriented role in the gallery was difficult, so they eventually went back to full time art, allowing Rita to run the gallery solely. "It was difficult when a partner left but it happened over several years," she said. "They all left their mark and had an impact on where we are today."

Today, the gallery hosts a wide variety of artistic mediums, including ceramics, painting, photography, encaustic work, glass and mosaics, fiber and woodworking, jewelry and more.

The gallery opened in August of 2010, still feeling the effects of the recession. Rita said that, despite the economic situation and some early struggles, the feedback from the community was very positive. When asked about how the gallery has supported artists throughout the years, Rita spoke on the spirit of camaraderie at Red Chair. "We have approximately 30 artists in the Red Chair Gallery," she said. "I am pretty sure each and everyone here knows everyone. We are a pretty personable family oriented Red Chair community. It is nothing like it might be in a company you work for. They cover for each other in emergencies, they meet for meals and some even travel together. I never experienced that kind of camaraderie in all my working life until the Red Chair Gallery."

Looking back over the years, Rita has learned quite a bit about how to effectively run an art gallery, "Over time, we have tightened up many procedures and training times, adjusted artwork inventory to address the seasons and made strict policies for times when something as bad as COVID shows up," she said. "If downtown activity affects our sales at any given time, we do not compete with that; we just shorten our hours."

Another lesson comes in understanding what the community, both tourists and locals, actually want to buy. While summer profits are bolstered by visitors to the area, locals make up year round sales. A key to success comes in adjusting your offerings to reflect what those locals want to buy. This includes selling a variety of painting and artwork sizes, allowing for easier travel back home, either in a car or packed in luggage for a flight. Also, the gallery doubled their number of active jewelers in order to provide more options for smaller gifts.

Reflecting on that success, Rita is very grateful for the lessons learned, and the continual support from the Bend community, "I am very happy that we have reached our 15th year. It sort of snuck up on us. I would like to think we will be here to celebrate our 20th. A large percentage of our artists have been with us since the first day," she said.

Her last message to Bend is simply, "Thank you for everything," as she plans the future of the gallery, with hopes of maintaining their current business model and contributing to the culture of this community.

**A Community of Warm Springs Artists**

## Native Art Gallery & Shop in Warm Springs

pened in September of 2022, Tananáwit is a Native-owned and operated nonprofit art shop and gallery with a mission to promote, preserve and advance traditional artforms that are common among Native artists in the Warm Springs Reservation. Their gallery and art shop is filled 100 percent with Native art, with around 95 percent coming from artists within the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, which includes the Warm Springs, Wasco and Paiute tribes. The remaining 5 percent of the art comes from the groups' sister tribes, like the Confederated Tribes of Umatilla.

In the 2010s, a group of community members and artists in Warm Springs came together and decided they wanted to create an artists' co-op to help promote Native artists. They began working with the Warm Springs Community Action Team, also called WSCAT. "Once WSCAT got involved, they began to pull in other organizations that might be able to help out, including the Oregon Native American Business and Entrepreneurs Network (ONABEN)," said Tananáwit's Executive Director Debbie Stacona.

Debbie spent over 20 years working at the Museum at Warm Springs and recalls absolutely loving her work. Her passion for supporting Native art, history and culture drives her to spend each day trying to make a difference for artists and community members who can sometimes be overlooked in the broader Central Oregon art scene. Throughout her career, supporting the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs has always been a top priority.

"We exist solely to help our community," Debbie said. "Tananáwit wouldn't be here without the trust and support from so many people, from artists and community members to the visitors who see us along the highway and choose to come in."

The word Tananáwit, from the Indigenous Ichishkin language, is not directly translated to English. The language has the same roots as languages spoken by the Yakama and Nez Perce, and in 2014, there were only an estimated 50 fluent speakers of the language. Debbie did not recognize the word when she was first hired, but she gained some insight after speaking to a tribal elder who was also a linguist of the language.

"She told me that tananáwit was the first everything," Debbie said. "Tananáwit was the first huckleberry plucked, the first salmon caught, the

first ceremony, the first root pulled... It's the first of everything, and it also implies growth, or continuation."

The name is fitting for the nonprofit. Tananáwit is the first of its kind in Warm Springs, and it has already expanded to create a larger gallery and shop. Not only that, but the mission of the nonprofit also reflects this idea. For many Native artists and their careers, this is their tananáwit; the beginning of their career as a professional artist who is growing in their own skills while also teaching others.

"We started out with 30 artists, and even that took some time, just to gain their trust and show them that we value them and their art, not profits," Debbie said. "Now we have art from 61 artists, all of whom are Native."

One of the ways in which Tananáwit supports Native art is by having workshops for artists and community members to come learn a variety of skills. They have held entrepreneurial classes for artists, to help them manage the business side of their career in art. For kids and adults in the community, there are classes run by artists who are master weavers, jewelry makers, painters, sculptures, and much more (an upcoming workshop will teach adults how to make moccasins). A major reason why Tananáwit was founded and why they have remained successful, is the massive amount of community support they have received. They wanted to expand the gallery by occupying an adjacent space that was already inhabited by another business, and the other business simply agreed to move to allow the gallery to expand. Some of the art came from the Museum at Warm Springs, and only took one phone call (and a walk across the highway) to retrieve.


Aside from one-off stories of other organizations going out of their way to support Tananáwit, community support can be seen by the eagerness of artists to get in the gallery, and the popularity of their workshops.

Debbie and her team, which is composed of three people (including herself), are very grateful to be the recipients of a \$200,000, two-year grant from the First Nations Development Institute. The grant funds will be used to support the operations of the nonprofit while allowing the artists featured in the gallery and art shop to greatly benefit from their sold work.

Now having spent two years at Tananáwit, Debbie has big plans for the future. From more physical expansion of the gallery to house more art and artists to increasing the frequency and size of workshops, there is plenty to be done.

"It's really all about the community," Debbie said. "As long as they keep supporting our growth, we'll keep growing."



## Joan Sheets' Mission is Art Education

f your elementary school child has enjoyed an art project in a Redmond School District school, there is a good chance that Joan Sheets was the driving force behind it.

When Joan and husband Don Sheets, a noted woodworker, moved to Eagle Crest in 2008, they learned that there was no money in the Redmond School District budget for art education at the elementary level. As a retired art teacher, Joan took that as a challenge. She co-founded Art on the River in Eagle Crest and gave a percentage of the sales and raffle proceeds to the Redmond schools to use for art education. Art on the River was successful and ongoing up until the pandemic.

Since 2020, she has focused her energies toward the same goal through her work with Dry Canyon Arts Association (DCAA), where she serves as Education Chair. With Joan's guidance, DCAA has been able to place art education projects in several Redmond area schools. DCAA's art education goals are much more ambitious this year. They plan to collect enough funds through grants and donations to put art education into every Redmond elementary school. DCAA calls this new program Jumpstart Art and Joan believes you will hear a lot more about it during the upcoming school year.

Joan knows from experience the value of early

education. She was drawing, painting and even creating displays for department stores at an early age. Her early exposure to art won her a scholarship to the University of Oregon. She later graduated from Oregon State University with a degree in art education and went on to earn her Masters of Teaching from Lewis and Clark College.

Joan has taught at institutions as diverse as Corvallis Senior High School, Lane Community College, Mt. Sylvan Community Adult Education program, and Thomas Edison High School for different learners, all while working on her own art in her Portland studio. While in Portland, she was represented by several galleries in Portland and Seattle.

When she is not busy securing education opportunities for Redmond elementary children, she works out of her Eagle Crest studio. She says it is separate enough from the house that it makes a "perfect, happy place to create." Meanwhile, her husband Don works away in the woodworking shop he built off of the garage. "We are both in heaven when we are working there."

Although Joan's portfolio includes many works of art for your walls, her later work is meant to enhance your neck: silk scarves hand painted with scenes of birds, animals, and Oregon landscapes. She finds immense pleasure in watching the colorful dyes react



with the 100% Habotai silk and creating something both useful and beautiful.

If you think that one person can't make a difference in the lives of children, just spend a day with Joan. She may have something in common with another woman who embarked on a mission to make a difference. "One of my high school students once sarcastically asked me, 'Who do you think you are anyway, Joan of Art?' I laughed and it stuck with the whole school so I have been Joan of Art ever since."

The public is invited to meet "Joan of Art" at a reception in her honor at Cascade Hasson Sotheby's International Realtors in Downtown Redmond during September's First Friday Art Walk, September 6, between 5-8pm. Joan's art will be installed at Sotheby's for the month of September and she will be on hand with a selection of her scarves. Her husband, Don Sheets, will bring some of his custom wood works to display. Hors d'oeuvres and beverages will be served.

# A Cowboy Goes to War





## Oregon's Newest Poet Laureate Joins MUSIC IN A LANDSCAPE: Classical Music in the Wild

llen Waterston, Oregon's newly appointed Poet Laureate will present an original poem commissioned by IN A LANDSCAPE: Classical Music in the Wild at the IN A LANDSCAPE concert on Sunday, September 22, 2024. In collaboration with IN A LANDSCAPE Artistic Director, Hunter Noack, Waterston has created poems for several IN A LANDSCAPE concerts in its nine-year history, inspired by the desert locales.

Hunter Noack, classical pianist and naturalist travels with a ninefoot Steinway grand piano across the American West and Canada with the classical series IN A LANDSCAPE: Classical Music in the Wild. "Ellie has a way of capturing the soul of a place with her poetry," said Noack. "Our mutual passion is to connect the audience with the landscape and create new and transformative experiences."Tickets are available for the concert to see Waterston and Noack. Noack's nonprofit concert series is named for the piece *In a Landscape* by John Cage. Cage, like other post-war avant garde composers, challenged listeners to

"What surprises me every concert," says Noack, "are the moments of serendipity... when the leaves blow or the birds dance perfectly in time with the music, as if choreographed by a divine hand. 



Toriizaka Art is featuring the works of Nguyen Thanh Binh (Vietnam) during the month of September. Born in 1954, he graduated from the fine art university in Saigon in 1983. His paintings are artistically rendered with subdued hues of creams, browns and whites, punctuated occasionally with reds and blacks. He likens his preference for simplicity in composition and design to his own way of life, noting that his paintings often express his sorrow and the sorrow of many in his generation.

The elegance of his nudes and women in traditional Ao Dai moves beyond the form of his subjects and captures their innate grace and beauty that is at once private and at once a collective appreciation of poetic beauty. In his figurative paintings of musicians, dancers, families, etc. there is a sense of movement and engagement with each individual expressing a story about themselves individually as well as sharing the story of who they are within the group.

The background itself is also a subject; albeit pared down and minimalist. When asked about his approach, Binh cites Japanese haiku as an inspiration. Just as a haiku contains only three lines, its meaning is profound. Similarly, art can have great meaning with very minimal color and detail.

One of Binh's objectives is to ensure that his art speaks universally in a language which can be understood by everyone, no matter how educated or sophisticated. Composition, characters, colors, and style seem to come into being on his canvases effortlessly. Many of Binh's paintings come from personal experience and reveal his emotions often evoking profound feelings amongst his viewers. His themes and subject matter are simple, but their impact is significant.

ark your calendar for Saturday September 14 4-6pm to visit the Artists' Gallery in the Village at Sunriver. The Gallery will be sharing Wine and Nibbles and Artist demonstrations. The variety of high quality art is always fun to see, and visitors are able to meet the artists and discuss the artwork.

Featured this month is glass artist Becky Henson. Henson says that selecting the colors and textures of the glass, making the scores, snapping the breaks, and even the smell of soldering is all what she loves about making stain glass art. Most admirers are simply taken with the beauty of each piece, but Henson takes into consideration the specific qualities of the glass, especially the way light highlights and changes the properties of the glass. In the past 30 years, the artist has created many commissioned pieces that include sliding and stationary windows, lamps, people doors, sidelight, boxes, sun catchers, and many other projects both large and small.

Painter Bill Hamilton has a passion for art that he says is a precious gift from God. His colorful painting subjects include local landscapes, people, animals, birds, flowers, and, well, just about anything. Hamilton paints commissions that will fit into just the perfect spot in your home or business. Lucky for collectors, Hamilton's work comes in all sizes and price ranges. Particularly clever are his small realistic animal representations painted directly on to rock material. Also popular are his mounted prints of local mountains and scenery. Painter Lori Orlando is not content to stay with only one media. She uses pastel, colored pencil, and oils to achieve the colorful, crisply lined and detail that makes her work special. Orlando's realistic style of painting focuses on wildlife, landscapes, and still life. Her subject matter can include anything from food or birds to buoys, but mostly she prefers nature. The play of color, light, and shadow as it develops in a painting gives a sense of excitement and anticipation. Orlando says, "If something calls me to paint, then it must be!"

Metal artist Jesse Pemberton's earliest works include life size ceramic selfportraits, installations of melting ice, found object, bronze castings, and audio/ video composites. (Unfortunately, we don't have any of those on display!) Pemberton makes drawings and expands his growing catalog of collaborative public art projects in California and Oregon. The artist is most known for his spectrum of abstract metal compositions. He works predominantly in sculpture derived from steel with an emphasis of post-industrial materials. Most pieces are 3-dimensional, but many can be hung for viewing.
