Bend Film Festival 21 Years of Storytelling

he 2024 Bend Film Festival is gearing up for its 21st year, ready to showcase some of the most exciting films from around the world. From October 10-13, Bend will be buzzing with film screenings, panels, workshops, and enough cinematic excitement to keep everyone talking long after the credits roll. And while there's plenty of industry chatter and international talent, this year's festival feels more connected than ever to its Central Oregon roots — locals are not just welcome, they're integral to the whole vibe.

With over 38 features, 68 shorts, and a powerful spotlight on Indigenous programming, this year's festival is a celebration of diverse voices and bold stories. But it's not just for the cinephiles — whether you're stopping by for a single film, or diving in headfirst with a festival pass, there's something for everyone. With films like Indigenous basketball drama *Rez Ball* opening the festivities, and *Anora*, a fast-paced, gripping tale about a Brooklyn sex worker and her oligarch-in-law (it's complicated), closing the show, attendees can expect a genre-bending roller coaster of stories.

Basecamp: Where Emerging Filmmakers Find Their Footing (and Network Like Pros)

Before the festival kicks off, a group of emerging filmmakers will be sweating it out at BendFilm's inaugural Basecamp. Running from October 7-10, this residency and networking retreat is BendFilm's latest foray into filmmaker education, designed to give up-and-coming directors, writers, and producers the resources they need to not just survive, but thrive in the industry.

"We're excited to welcome the first class of Basecamp alumni at this year's Festival alongside attending directors, producers, and more," says BendFilm Executive Director Giancarlo Gatto. "It's exciting to see so much of our year-round work and community engagement coming to fruition." In other words, expect a lot of productive conversations at panels and post-screening Q&As, where hopefuls are sure to absorb all the wit and wisdom seasoned filmmakers have to offer.

BendFilm's Lineup Casts a Wide Net

Elsewhere on the honoree front, Karyn Kusama is named the Indie Filmmaker of the Year and will treat attendees to screenings of her breakout *Girlfight* and the wildly





intense *Destroyer*, starring Nicole Kidman. With films that explore gritty, often violent worlds through a deeply personal lens, Kusama has carved out a space for herself in the indie film scene that few can rival.

This year's festival is, as usual, an eclectic mix of narratives, documentaries, shorts, and music videos from a global roster of filmmakers. The competition features span four categories — Narrative, Documentary, Indigenous, and Environmental/ Outdoor — and reflect BendFilm's commitment to showcasing work that is as diverse as it is daring.

Herewith, a selection of some of the programming team's favorites:

Goodbye, Julia

Set against the backdrop of Sudan just before the secession of South Sudan, *Goodbye Julia* tells the tense and heart-wrenching story of Mona, a retired singer, who accidentally kills a Southern child in a hit-and-run. Overcome with guilt, she offers the child's mother, Julia, a job in her home without revealing the truth. The film explores themes of class, guilt, and the devastating effects of war on personal lives. With a riveting emotional core, this film is sure to leave an impression.

Bye Bye Tiberias

This intimate documentary focuses on four generations of Palestinian women, led by actress Hiam Abbass (known for *Succession*). The film follows Abbass and her daughter as they return to their Palestinian village, exploring the enduring legacies of separation and displacement across generations. *Bye Bye Tiberias* isn't just a documentary — it's a poetic meditation on family, identity, and the lasting effects of exile.

Firebreak

Follow Brandon and Royal, two men who met while incarcerated and working as firefighters. Now out of prison, they're training other formerly incarcerated individuals to join their new, selfowned firefighting organization. With institutional barriers and environmental dangers at every turn, the film highlights their struggle for redemption and a second chance at life. A powerful story of resilience, *Firebreak* is a timely exploration of the intersection of incarceration and climate change.

A New Kind of Wilderness

Set against the stunning forests of Norway, *A New Kind of Wilderness* follows a family who chooses to live off the grid, embracing a lifestyle as wild and free as their surroundings. However, when tragedy strikes, they are forced to reevaluate their values and reintegrate into modern society. With beautiful cinematography and a haunting reflection on the push-and-pull between nature and civilization, this documentary is a lyrical meditation on survival, family, and the cost of isolation.

Your Fat Friend

Over six years, director Jeanie Finlay follows activist and anonymous blogger Aubrey Gordon on her journey from online sensation to a New York Times best-selling author. Gordon's mission is to challenge societal perceptions of fat people, and her work has made her both a beloved advocate and a target of threats. *Your Fat Friend* doesn't just examine fatphobia; it also explores the personal toll of activism and the complex relationships that come with public life. Emotional, raw, and timely, this is a documentary you won't forget.

Rent Free

Hitting rock bottom never looked quite like this. Two down-and-out Gen Z friends concoct a scheme to live a year without paying rent by crashing with friends, family, and the occasional stranger. Set in Austin, this hilariously scrappy film is both a love letter to creative freeloading and a biting commentary on the challenges of economic survival in a rapidly gentrifying city. It's clever, relatable, and sure to strike a chord with anyone who's ever had to think outside the box to make rent.

Indigenous Programming: Spotlight on Voices That Need to Be Heard

Sydney Freeland is a true multihyphenate writer, director, producer — and this year, BendFilm is adding Indigenous Honoree and jury member to that list. After *Rez Ball* opens the Festival, two episodes of the Freeland-directed limited series ECHO will screen in Madras as part of the Festival's programming there. Beyond *Rez Ball*, the festival's Indigenous Features Competition shines with films like *Missing From Fire Trail Road*, a haunting documentary about the disappearances of Indigenous women in America and *Singing Back the Buffalo*, an epic reimagining of North America through a buffalo's lens. These stories, like the cultures they represent, are multifaceted, gripping, and offer unique perspectives.

Keep It Short

Let's not forget the shorts — 68 of them, to be exact, drawn from 24 countries. Three categories (Narrative, Indigenous, and Animated) are Oscarqualifying, meaning some of these bite-sized gems might go on to nab the film world's most prestigious gold statue (indeed, last year's *Knight of Fortune* cinched a nomination). Shorts are grouped into thematic blocks like *Fear Eats the Soul* (because, of course, it does), *Modern Love* (for the romantically hopeful...or doomed), and *Late Night* (featuring films that are likely to have you squirming in your seat, or at least wildly uncomfortable in a good way).

"We love that the shorts program lets these films speak to one another," says Programming Director Selin Sevinç. "It creates a dimensional take on an issue or mood and allows the audience to come away with a really rich, layered perspective."

Panels, Prizes, and Plenty of After-Parties

Offscreen, the festival will also feature panels, discussions, and workshops that promise to give festivalgoers insider intel they crave. Juries comprised of industry heavyweights will hand out over

\$12,500 in prizes across categories, ensuring that emerging and independent filmmakers get their due.

And let's not forget the après-screening festivities. Bend, a paradise for outdoor enthusiasts, foodies, and beer lovers, will be buzzing with film industry types and eager cinephiles alike, making it the perfect setting for spontaneous pitch sessions, or maybe just a very passionate debate about the film you just saw.

"I'm a narrative painter, fascinated by *doppelgängers*," *Bullwinkel, formerly of Bend, said of her central theme.* "Folklore tells us everyone has a 'double-goer,' a mysterious, identical copy, both familiar and strange, suggesting the possibility of multiple universes where infinite versions of one's life play out simultaneously."

A former fashion and entertainment photographer — who captured icons like Kate Moss, Sinead O'Connor, Lenny Kravitz and Morgan Freeman — Bullwinkel made a switch to oil canvases and has led an extensive career as a fine artist for over 20 years, with a style that explores dream-like scenes and imagery. She taught art and photography at COCC for a number of years.

Bullwinkel has been featured on OPB's *Oregon Art Beat*, held artist residencies in settings as diverse as Vermont and Portugal, earned a fellowship from the Ford Family Foundation and received grant backing from the Oregon Arts Commission. She received a bachelor's degree in English Literature with a minor in painting from the University of California, Berkeley, and a master's degree in art education with a minor in painting at Montclair State University.





Pastel landscape paintings by Jan Dow will be featured by the Oxford Hotel during the month of October. Jan is fascinated by images reflected





nvisible Thread Events was founded two years ago by Caitlin McDonough with the goal of bringing connection, and more house shows, to Bend. Wanting to get more into the underground art and music scene but not knowing where to start, Caitlin decided to throw her own version.

After one successful show that featured a visual artist, Caitlin wanted to

grow that experience and make it something more. "I slowly discovered that there are so many unique artists around town who would love to run a creative workshop, and to showcase their work," she said.

However, Caitlin also discovered an issue in the local arts community. Bend has many talented artists, but they are all people who struggle with the same things we all struggle with; motivation and resources like time and money are two big ones.

Wanting to see Bend's art scene continue to evolve with shows like the one she ran, Caitlin decided to begin the outreach herself, by just talking to local artists and trying to figure out how she could help everyone come together and celebrate their work. "I have been able to step in and take on the role of organizer for events like these, and that's how I met Rachel."

Rachel Lee-Carman is another artist working with Caitlin to bring together and organize house shows and similar events. For the past six months, Rachel has been working with Caitlin to bring more events to life, and to foster connection. A recent event they hosted was called Entangle. Similar to the name Invisible Threads, Entangle had an underlying goal of connection, and bringing people together through a "threads of fate" like idea.

This show featured artists who have been challenged to create something new to present, share or perform. The goal was for each work to, in some way,

> represent connection and community. Each art exhibit or performance must also be interactive. "Everyone was immediately so onboard and stoked for this idea," said Caitlin, echoing the sentiment that artists, when given the opportunity and the means, will often rise to the occasion to do something new, different and maybe even a little weird (in a good way). "It's been so inspiring to see that initial spark of motivation take over and to watch artists just run with it."

> Seeing this inspired Caitlin to modify the mission of Invisible Thread. At first, the goal was to bring more house shows to Bend. Now, Caitlin sees Invisible Thread as an outlet for creativity and a way to cultivate connection among artists and creatives.

> Entangle took place on September 13 and 14 from 12-10pm each day. A ticket included access to the collaborative and immersive work of more than 30 local artists, live performances and film screenings, as well as ongoing community installations fostering connection and community through art.

ow do you view the world? Through rose colored glasses? Through a practical or artistic eye?

Prineville artist Krystal Allen views it searching for beauty in abstract lines. Always considering composition, light and shadow, capturing moments in time are what excites her when creating her art. Whether painting in oils or watercolors or making graphite drawings, she shares her vision of our time and place, hoping to bring a bit of beauty and peace, and perhaps a bit of excitement to her viewers. Focusing primarily on landscapes, studio and plein air, she also delves into some figurative work, animals, and still life.

Enamored with drawing at a very young age, she gradually honed her skills capturing what she saw. Fortunate to have the same art teacher throughout grammar and high school, this consistent influence was big boost to her skills and confidence in her creative vision. While studying advertising and design in college she learned much about marketing which would play a significant role in her professional life.

Before retiring from her job as the West Coast sales manager for *PleinAir* and *Fine Art Connoiusseur* magazines, she worked for a picture frame manufacturer designing frames with custom finishes and managing their flagship design showroom and art gallery. It was at this job she had the privilege to design and frame an illustration done by one of her biggest influences, N.C. Wyeth, as well as many other noted







artists, historic and contemporary. While doing all of this she was active in her local art market, helping to raise funds and awareness through her art for a small museum, a national seashore, saving San Francisco Bay, and several other nonprofit organizations.

She moved to Prineville in 2015 and spent two years helping her husband remodel and improve a 1952 property where her studio is housed. Her work can in the upcoming Sisters Harvest Faire October 12 and 13 and the Dry Canyon Arts Association Fall Art Show at the Redmond High School November 16 and 17. In July of 2025 she will have an exhibit of Rodeo themed pieces at the Clymer Museum and Gallery in Ellensburg, Washington where there is also a Rodeo Hall of Fame on permanent exhibit.

Currently she is an active member of the Plein Air Painters of Oregon and the Dry Canyon Arts Association participating in events when the opportunity arises.

Red Chair Gallery Presents Justin LeBart Potter

Potter Justin LeBart loves to inject humor into his work. While art can often veer into the stuffiness of so-called "fine art," LeBart tries to "put the fun into the functional." He sees his role as "making smiles and creating respites of happiness." His pottery is showcased at Red Chair Gallery in October.

Pour boys is the name he gives to small vessels with gaping mouths and buggy eyes. They can be used for pouring syrup or oil and vinegar, or as vases or planters, or just as conversation pieces. His *Cereal Killer* bowls feature smiling monster faces. Mugs with cartoonish black cat faces were inspired by a black kitten he owned. (LeBart considers black cats good luck rather than bad and currently has two of them.) He designs planters with large googly eyes so that the plant's leaves will grow to resemble hair above the eyes.

Born and raised in coastal Massachusetts, LeBart became entranced with art in high school under the tutelage of a teacher who arranged for him to take advanced placement art courses. He started out at the University of Massachusetts —



Dartmouth in ceramics but was so bad at it that he switched to sculpture. Along the way, he worked in mixed media performance and installation. For a college project, he borrowed a giant popcorn maker from a movie theater, bought a 50 pound bag of corn and filled an entire room with delicious smelling popcorn. "It was a playful way of looking at art," he laughs, "kind of poking fun at how serious the fine arts were."

After graduating, LeBart managed a local video store while continuing his art in his free time but the Blockbuster chain opened a competing location and forced the other store out of business. So he decided to follow some college buddies who had moved to Phoenix. There he started out bartending and working in restaurants and hooked up with a potter friend who was teaching at the Phoenix and Mesa Art Centers. His friend encouraged him to make clay sculptures but he also became skilled at throwing pots on a wheel. Soon he got an apprenticeship there and began helping with classes while continuing to make his own pots.

Eventually, LeBart attended Northern Arizona State University to get a master's degree in teaching. For his student teaching requirements, he instructed at NATO's military headquarters, Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE), near Brussels, Belgium. That gave him the opportunity to visit other parts of Europe,





where he saw a lot of stuffy fine art and plenty of newer art in museums and galleries.

After graduation in 2007, LeBart decided to move to Bend, again following friends. He joined the Cindercone Clay Center here to get back into ceramics. After a few years of substitute teaching and restaurant gigs, he eventually purchased a house in Deschutes River Woods, which he named Journeyman Studios. There he makes and fires his pots and also rehearses with his band, gBots and the Journeymen, for which he plays the bass. He is also an adjunct professor at Central Oregon Community College in the Art and Design Department.

Bend's Beloved 20-Dollar Art Show

Returns to the High Desert Museum



t's almost time for the return of Bend's biggest little art event, *The 20-Dollar Art Show*! Presented by Bright Place Gallery, this year's exhibition will feature a record 6,041 original works by 272 artists. Sizing a maximum 36 square inches, each piece will be priced at just \$20, allowing art lovers to bring home unique creations from both established and emerging artists.

This year's featured works will be on view at the High Desert Museum starting Monday, October 14, and sales will begin with an exciting opening night extravaganza on Friday, October 18. During the extravaganza, attendees are invited to take the art they wish to purchase off of the Museum walls and home with them. Tickets for this popular event are on sale now at highdesertmuseum.org/20-art-show-info. Admission is \$5 per adult with ages 16 and under entering for free. Space is limited and tickets sell quickly, so early purchase is recommended.

Bright Place Gallery, led by Stuart Breidenstein and Abby Dubief, first launched *The 20-Dollar Art Show* as a platform for artists to showcase their work and engage with the community in a supportive environment. Since its inception in 2013, *The 20-Dollar Art Show* has grown significantly. In 2019, the show featured over 2,100 pieces and sold 900 artworks on opening night alone. Five years later, the show is back stronger than ever, with significantly more featured artists and artwork than in previous years.

Laura Fouts Paints What Speaks To Her

Some paintings capture a scene that could come from anywhere. Laura Fouts captures scenes that could only come from this certain place. In viewing her work, those who live or play in This Certain Place get a feeling of belonging to a club of smart or lucky folk who know the value of what they are viewing — a real life "If you know, you know" wink.

When complimented on her choice of subjects, Fouts said, "I love to convey the beauty around us, but I tend to paint whatever speaks to me. I recently painted three donkeys peeking in a car because the reference photo made me giggle." The reference photo was provided by friend Vicki Zahler.

Since girlhood, Fouts has grabbed at every opportunity to learn art, make art, or be around art, starting by copying her favorite childhood book illustrations and continuing through art education and creative jobs. Fouts has worked in retail display, sign making, calligraphy, tile painting, and art studio management, all the while creating art out of her home studio.

These days Fouts' art medium of choice is pastel. "Pastels are very tactile," Fouts noted. "You get to feel every mark you make since the stick of pastel is touching your fingers." The pastel is applied directly as opposed to other mediums which require a tool such as a brush. The biggest drawback, she says, is that you have to depend on the pastel colors you have there is no way to make a color from two separate colors other than blending them on the paper. "Every pastelist I know feels they need more sticks because one seems to never have the right color."

Fouts strongly believes in continuing education. "I just want to keep learning and improving." She enjoys

working in her studio but also takes advantage of local opportunities such as a weekly pastel painting group offered through Sagebrushers Art Society in Bend. "It's so helpful to paint with a group to promote your growth and skill building," she said.

Fouts also gives back to the arts community by managing the Lend Me Your Walls program at Grace and Hammer Pizzeria. The Lend Me Your Walls program was created and is operated by Dry Canyon Arts Association based in Redmond. The goal of Lend Me Your Walls is to provide Redmond citizens with a rotating display of local art, as well as providing local artists with a place to display their art in a city that is currently lacking any gallery representation. Dry Canyon Arts Association currently provides art to eight locations within the Redmond area.

"Lend Me Your Walls is such a great way for artists to start to show their work and acquire the skills needed to enter art shows," Fouts said. "You learn how to submit your work, prepare it to hang in a show, edit artwork photos to fit art show criteria. These are all skills required if you want to show your work in competitions. I think Lend Me Your Walls also gives the participating artists more confidence to get their work out in public in a very non-threatening way."

Laura Fouts' work has been celebrated locally, such as the Best of Show ribbon she won at the 2022 Deschutes County Fair, but she has recently been noticed statewide with a 2nd place award in the Pastel Artists of Oregon online art competition. "That award meant a lot to me because the competition is much greater than local shows," she said.

Her latest award, being named Artist of the Month by Dry Canyon Arts Association, will be celebrated during Redmond's First Friday Art



Denmark's First Steinway Artist Jens Elvekjaer

n Sunday, October 6, High Desert Chamber Music will open its 17th season by presenting Trio con Brio Copenhagen, an esteemed Denmark-based piano trio who will be making their Central Oregon debut! I had the opportunity to speak with pianist Jens Elvekjaer about his history with the group and his love of chamber music.

Jens is a native of Copenhagen and widely considered to be one of Denmark's leading young artists, as well as being Denmark's first Steinway Artist. He has studied in Arhaus, Denmark; Cologne, Germany; and at the Vienna Conservatory. While Jens has had a brilliant career as a soloist, he was eager to chat with me about all the facets of Trio con Brio. The group formed in 1999 in Vienna when Jens met Soo-Jin Hong and Soo-Kyung Hong, sisters from South Korea. After settling in Copenhangen in 2003 and performing around the area, the trio won the prestigious Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson International Trio Award in 2005 launching them to international renown.

Jens is an enthusiastic supporter of other chamber musicians. Alongside the other members of the trio, he is artistic director at "Chamber Music at Lundsgaard," a chamber music festival in Denmark. "It is very inspiring. We are privileged to have frequent opportunities to sit on the 'other' side and listen to other musicians perform." Jens also mentioned that the process of programming a festival is very rewarding. It involves lots of listening and research to determine suitable programs that are cohesive. Inspiration comes from a lot of places, including visiting museums, getting outside, and even trying new foods!

When asked about what repertoire the trio likes performing best, Jens said, "We have always been keen on playing Russian and Slavic repertoire." This is particularly evidenced by the Trio's latest recording of works by Arensky and Shostakovich. Having formed in Vienna, the Viennese Classics are also close to the members' hearts. The Trio has recorded the complete Piano Trios of Beethoven and found that it brought them closer to his music. The group is also committed to contemporary music and tries to include something in every season. The Weinberg piano trio in the upcoming concert is a good example, having been composed in 1945. They have also been honored to perform works written for them by modern Scandinavian composers.

For Jens and the rest of the Trio, strengthening musical outreach is one of the most important aspects of classical musicians. "We need to connect the music with other arts to begin with and to put all these works in a context, whether it be political; historical; or emotional,

where as many people as possible can relate to the amazing compositions." One area that the Trio is especially passionate about is getting kids involved in classical music. Several years ago, they began a series of children's concerts to bring "adult music" in front of kids. Having kids himself, Jens finds providing opportunities to children and young adults is very important.

Please join us on Sunday, October 6 at 4pm at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Central Oregon program of Beethoven, Prokofiev, and Weinberg. 





A Life in the Owner of Rimrock Gallery Retires

amela Claffin, the original owner of Rimrock Gallery in Prineville, will be stepping down and closing the gallery after five years at Rimrock, and 25 plus years in the world of art galleries and management. At 77 years old, Pamela has spent decades contributing to the art culture of Central Oregon, as an artist and as a gallery owner. While she will be leaving the gallery, her impact will be felt for years to come as the individual responsible for so much fine art in the region.

Pamela proclaimed from a young age (during a high school art class) that she would one day become a painter. Not only did she accomplish this with more serious practice in her 30s while attending lessons from national level artists, she took her dream a step further and made it her mission to bring fine art to her communities.

Pamela founded Bend's Mockingbird Gallery, which she ran for 18 years before selling. Her mission upon selling? To use her wealth of experience and skill to bring fine art to her hometown of Prineville. "Two years before I opened Rimrock, I had moved back to Prineville. I wanted to be in a smaller town, and be close to Bend while not being in the center of it all," Pamela said.

Pamela said that, at first, tons of people shook their heads at the idea of her opening Rimrock Gallery. The gallery's price range, while still having space for local art, would not shy away from national-level, fine art. Most other galleries in town lasted a year, maybe a year and six months, before closing. Even in larger cities, it can be difficult for a gallery to maintain both artists and business; at least, enough to stay afloat.

After five years of success at Rimrock, Pamela said she feels like it was all meant to be. From the relationships she formed with artists and customers to the overall acceptance from the community, she said it all just came together right.

Pamela's success came from a few specific factors; first, she was able to leverage her wealth of experience and professional relationships to open a gallery with high-level artists (and highlevel management) from the jump. Her commitment to excellence never dropped as the years went on.

Second, she was able to quickly pivot during the COVID-19 Pandemic by hosting an art sale that got them through the tough time.

Third, and potentially most importantly, Pamela loves what she does and who she gets to work with. A full believer in the motto of, "if you love what you do, you don't work a day," Pamela can look back on her career and her time at Rimrock with fondness for each customer, artist, and every



little interaction she had in her gallery. "I love being busy and I love having a gallery," she said. "No other business has clients and customers like this. You get to meet so many wonderful people and make so many friends. There is so much respect for the work, and tons of kindness to go around."

Pamela recalls telling some of her customers that she was retiring, and they met her with teary eyes, sad to see her go. However, interactions like this just speak to the impact that Pamela had on the communities she was a part of. Mockingbird Gallery is still going strong in Bend, and Rimrock was able to bring fine art to a place that had, for years, seemed indifferent towards the practice.

From artists she worked with, customers she sold to and the random passersbys who stopped in to say hi, Pamela is grateful, "I just want to say thank you to everyone for their support, and I will miss seeing those people in my gallery," she said. "It makes me feel so special and so blessed to look back on this career with all these amazing people."

When she was just in high school, Pamela proclaimed that she would become a painter. Little did she know at the time, but she would eventually lead a career in the arts that would help put the Central Oregon fine art scene on the map. Her advice to someone as young as she was in that art class? Do what you love and pursue your passion, and success will come. "You make it happen because you love it," Pamela said. "That's my lesson."

The final closing sale of Rimrock Gallery will start on Friday, October 4 and go until Saturday November 2. The gallery will officially close to the public on November 3. Pamela has invited everyone to come in, buy a discounted piece of art and say hi.



Sisters Arts Association Presents Artist Michael A. Stasko

he Deschutes Plateau Suite, new landscapes by Michael A. Stasko, will be the featured offering at Sisters Gallery and Frame on Friday, October 25, as part of the Sisters Arts Association's Fourth Friday Artwalk.

The images portray views that are some of Stasko's favorites, as he describes. "Leaving the rugged Deschutes River canyon from Maupin and heading south to Sisters, one climbs rapidly and circuitously to the western elevations of the Deschutes Umatilla plateau. On a fair day, the vistas appear limitless, with Mount Adams, Mount Hood, Mount Jefferson, Three Fingered Jack, Mount Washington, and our beloved North, Middle, and South Sisters marching off in the distance. On a very clear day, one might even see Mount Rainier to the north. In wilder weather, rain squalls and thunderstorms spill down the eastern flanks of Mount Hood, shrouding the plateau in mysterious and ominous mists, rain, and clouds."

Stasko's new works are based on photographs he took during a single day's travel across the Deschutes Plateau. "I explore the effects of light over distance and ever changing vistas during stormy weather. While I choose to use a photograph as the basis for an image, I do not strictly adhere to the natural colors of the landscape. What feels right and creates a mood is of more importance to me," Stasko explains.

The renderings are done on four-ply 100 percent rag museum board that

stands up to repeated working. Stasko uses Prismacolor Premier pencils that are thick and soft, lay down evenly and provide good saturation of color.

The images are created using standard colored pencil techniques such as overlaying to create new and vibrant hues and construction of dark values, variations in pencil pressure, and in some cases, impressed line technique. No blenders or solvents are used, and the artist does not burnish his work.

"My technique is subtractive as much as additive," Stasko notes. "I use a kneaded eraser to lift pigment from the paper to expose lighter areas and to create and define contour. I have recently begun applying inert and non-toxic dry pigments with very soft brushes in order to lay down large areas of color in less time, allowing for larger formats."

A fixing technique adds a subtle luster to each finished piece.

Stasko's use of soft pigments applied lightly to the surface of textured museum board creates a unique depth and luminosity that must be seen to be appreciated.

Mike Stasko has a formal fine arts background with emphasis on drawing and printmaking techniques such as intaglio and serigraphy, but as a colored pencil artist, he is completely self-taught. He lives in Sisters, and has been exhibiting his work at Sisters Gallery and Frame since 2015.




