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
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

grew up here, in Bend. I've traveled to many far-off places that, when I was a kid, seemed to only exist in fairytales. I'm from a time when information about anything wasn't all kept in a back pocket, when imagination, inference and wonder filled in the gaps of what could be learned at the library or from our set of encyclopedias, when we needed to go to Portland to get trendy clothes.

Very early on, my Grandma Tommie noted how well I colored within the lines, and she'd always tell me that. One summer Saturday (I was probably nine), I spent the day at her house. We made chocolate-peach-banana milkshakes and she wanted me to draw my colored-pencil version of a painting of Jesus she had hanging prominently above the television in her living room. By the afternoon, I wasn't very proud of my drawing, but Grandma Tommie seemed pleased. My folks have a pencil drawing I did of an old truck hanging in their hallway, it won a ribbon at the fair. Grandma Tommie framed and proudly displayed it, and showed it off to her friends. I was never very pleased with it, because it wasn't my idea really, but from a book about doing pencil drawings.

I don't see my work as others do, and my paintings aren't finished when they're "perfect," but when I enjoy their imperfections so much that I can't bear to cover them up. The beauty of painting is in the undone — places where imagination, inference and wonder can play and dream, relate and ponder, delight and remember. Art simultaneously communicates truths about our shared humanity and reflects truths about our unique individualities, and when I believe my work does that, it's complete. Decades after drawing that old truck, I worried and labored over a portrait of Grandma Tommie. Her health declining, I felt an urgency to demonstrate that I made good use of her faith and encouragement. I painted and repainted her portrait over several weeks, four or five times, until even I was pleased with it: a testament to my love and gratitude and of her significance.

In her familiar living room, now kept darker, the television louder, proudly I gave her the painting. She studied it silently and I waited expectantly for some moments. Finally she asked, "What is that mark, there on my cheek?" "That's a shadow, Grandma," I replied. "It looks like catsup," she said. And I hung it above the television.

Red Chair Gallery Presents

JENNIFER BAKKER ACRYLIC ARTIST

any famous artists have been inspired by music. In contemporary American art they include Keith Haring, who loved The Grateful Dead and gained appreciation with his subway art in New York City, and Jean-Michel Basquiat, a neo-expressionist who was also a jazz afficionado. At Red Chair Gallery, Jennifer Bakker, who describes her art as abstract expressionism, paints to the beat of rock and rollers Led Zeppelin and Talking Heads. "If rock 'n roll could exist in visual form, I would like to capture it in form and color," she remarks. Her acrylic paintings are showcased at Red Chair Gallery in December.

The rhythms, chords and dissonances of music are a constant source of stimulation and elevation for her. "I'm always playing music," Bakker says. "It moves me as I'm painting." She may have a shape or

pattern in mind when she begins a piece but aims for spontaneity. "I don't think very much when I paint," she explains. She doesn't want the viewer to think too much either. Instead, she seeks to evoke an emotional or visceral response to her work.

In her work, Bakker loves to explore color relationships and uses highly textured surfaces. In applying color, she "instinctively places color layer by layer until I, myself, am pleased," she explains. With the idea of contrast in mind, she may pair neon pink with a somber color or just go wild with many colors. To create texture, she preps her canvases in various ways. She may attach crinkled foil with gesso, cut shapes from foam to stick on to create a raised surface, or use plaster on the canvas.

Bakker is inspired by several American artists who identify with abstract expressionism. At the top of her list is Joan Mitchell, who created large pieces with an intense style that comes from "gestural brushwork," which means painting from the shoulder instead of the wrist. "I like her use of color and the chaos of her line," she notes. Bakker employs the same brushwork technique in her work. Other influencers for her are Jackson Pollack, known for his "drip technique" of pouring or splashing paint onto horizontal surfaces, and Mark Rothko, who painted "color fields," which are areas of color shaped like squares or rectangles.

Born and raised in the Chicago area, Bakker loved drawing as a child. She drew a picture of a squirrel once and "decided it was the best thing ever," vowing to become an artist someday. But after obtaining a BFA degree from the University of Missouri, she didn't immediately become an artist. She worked various jobs and eventually took a trip to Kenya, where she began sketching people on the streets. There she met her husband, Ivo, who is from the Netherlands. They moved back to Chicago where Ivo became a manager for Trader Joe's. Over the years, they moved to Ashland, OR and had two children, then went back to Chicago. Bakker attained a nursing degree there and worked full time. She also learned to make mosaic art and sold her mirrors, tabletops and other pieces in galleries around Chicago.

Seven years ago, just as they were itching to get out of the big city and move to a more rural area, her husband was offered a managerial position at Bend's Trader Joe's store. Remembering how much they had enjoyed living in Ashland, they moved here. Bakker works in Bend as a psychiatric nurse but has found the time to rekindle her interest in painting. Come into Red Chair Gallery to see her striking and colorful work.

AN EXPLORER'S ODYSSEY Get to Know Kris Horn, DCAA Artist of the Month

Kris Horn

"E xploring different mediums is part of the search, gaining knowledge. It's the science end of it," says Kris Horn, Dry Canyon Art Association's Artist of the Month for December. "You wanna see what's gonna happen. You wanna see how it responds when you do this or you do that. How can you tell your story with that medium, and how does it differ from what you may have used in the past?" In the last nine years Kris has worked in pastels, oil pastels, oils and "I'm investigating acrylics now too. I'm trying to see what I respond to."

Kris got a taste for art exploration 50 years ago in a class in Eugene, Oregon at Maude Kerns Gallery. This would be a touchstone experience for her that she wouldn't return to for decades. But its impact was profound. "In those classes at Maude Kerns, the teacher believed I could become a painter, and I believed her," Kris says. "I could do things fairly easily. I grasped the concepts. I didn't have the background or formal education for things like the color value system, color temperature and all that. But I got the idea that I could do it."

A successful career as a real estate agent, and raising a family kept Kris from diving into painting with all her energy. Then in 2015 she saw some beautiful work of a couple of pastel artists, "and I thought 'I could do that.' It was obvious there was an immediacy to pastels, because that's the way it is. I responded to that because I worked full time and was on community boards and committees, and I thought 'that's something I could work into my horrible schedule!'"

Kris and her husband Barry moved to Central Oregon in June 2023, and she has happily joined the local arts community. Here she tells us what she thinks in her own words.

Why is it important to you to explore different mediums?

I find at my age, patience is something sometimes I have and sometimes I don't. I'm becoming conversant in other mediums so I can meet myself where I am on each day. So I get a sense of what the different mediums can do for me and what I can do for them.

What's something you've learned about creating that's important?

It's not for sissies! This is one of the reasons I wish I'd gotten a little more of the education when I was younger and more absorbent. I think this is true of all artists. It's a learning process all the time. Every time you pick up your stick of pastel or your brush, you discover new artist wisdom. Every time you do a painting, you learn something new. I think that's pretty brilliant. There's a lot to love about that. To be able to learn and grow, no matter what your age is. I hope I'm still doing this and learning new things and growing until I can't hold a brush anymore.

When you're working on a new piece, what's your most heartfelt wish for it?

It's not always the same. Sometimes I just want to pick up my brushes and have fun. And if it pleases me and I had fun painting it, that's all I wish for. Oddly enough, those pieces are the ones people tend to respond to. Other times I'm just creating what I think is a beautiful scene that I want people to respond to, people who maybe haven't had a chance to see that scene. I want them to see the beauty of it and respond to its nature.

WHO IS ART FOR?

uring a panel discussion at our art gallery, I posed a question to artist friends, gallery owners and patrons.

"As an artist, if you knew that your art somehow would never ever — be seen by anyone, would you still paint?"

As an artist, I had the extraordinary good fortune, fairly early in my art life, with my husband to own and operate our own gallery in Idyllwild, a small mountain town just above Palm Springs, California. My easel was

located in the main gallery so that patrons could view not only the work exhibited on the walls but stand nearby and watch my painting process. I found that I didn't mind their inquisitive gazing and possible questions or interruptions — it was always a pleasant way to start an art conversation.

With fondness I remember a fellow artist, known for his delightful sense of humor, who would take a position behind me, suddenly raising a pointed finger toward a section of my wet canvas and declare, "Mis-take!" And we would both always collapse in laughter.

I think of myself as a morning person, but I more easily do my best work as the day progresses, finding "the zone" only later in the afternoon, until finally, in order to close the gallery at 5:00 or 6:00 p.m., my husband would threaten to remove the paintbrush from my hand.

Getting back to the panel discussion and my posed question to the group, one dear artist friend immediately responded, "Well, of course I would still paint! It is so rewarding and nourishing for my soul."

I pondered her response and similar answers by other members in the gathering. My dear friend then turned to me and asked, "How about you, Jean? Would you still paint?"

"I don't know," I stammered. I could just hear my inner critic chastising me. "What do you mean you don't know? If you're a true artist, you *must* paint —



the artist within you demands it. You *can't* NOT paint!"

So what does this mean, I think to myself, full of self-doubt. Am I NOT a real artist? Not worthy? I DO love vibrant, lush oil color. It has texture and buttery gloss. And when dry, it is delightful to touch and does not have to be covered with a layer of glass, beyond reach. With my fingertips I'll sometimes caress an older painting, still in my possession, and remember back to the time of its creation — how I felt about it, the composition problems that needed to be solved — perhaps

the awards it received.

When we have the opportunity to travel to New York, my first stop is the Metropolitan Museum of Art. It's like entering a holy place, a cathedral of art. Inside the heavy glass doors, I raise my eyes to the marble columns, soaring ceiling and central staircase that beckons me to visit old friends — John Singer Sargent's *Madam X*, Jules Bastien-Lepage's *Joan of Arc* or Alexandre Cabanel's *Echo*. I certainly cannot touch these paintings, but my eyes closely examine each brushstroke to decipher and understand every nuance and subtlety.

Watercolor painter Frederic Whitaker said, "The world expects from the artist beauty, truth, inspiration, edification or leadership."

So, would I still paint if no one were to ever see it? And I still am not sure of my answer. I want the viewer to see through my eyes, to see my interpretation of a verdant landscape, a massive mountain peak, the lush beauty of Spring flowers or the strength and grace of a running horse. I want to add some beauty or knowledge to our world. Can I inspire someone or add beauty to their day, maybe even suggest a new idea or thought? Are these grandiose concepts? Perhaps so, but they're important, I think.

The benefit to me is the delight of creation, but my art is always for you, the viewer.







The Rich Words & Short Stories of REINALDO ALCAZAR

t was a destined partnership, and when Reinaldo Alcazar entered the Bend Latino Community Association (LCA) at the end of 2022, holding a box of the highly coveted Inglés Sin Barreras (English without barriers: A once coveted English as a Second Language curriculum that utilized CDs and DVDs to teach conversational English). He was donated a box of the curriculum and asked to speak with me about possibly becoming a tutor. After learning of his linguistic background and his story of emigrating from Bolivia, we began a long term relationship around the joint goal of teaching English to Spanish speaking immigrants/refugees.

Rey, as he became known around the LCA offices, immigrated to the United States from La Paz, Bolivia in 1960 and at the age of 18. He landed in Greeley, Colorado where he immediately earned a scholarship to play golf at University of Northern Colorado (FKA Colorado State Teachers College). He received his B.A. in Industrial Arts and Foreign Languages before going on to the University of Colorado in Boulder to complete his Masters and Ph.D. in

Hispanic Language, Culture, and Literature. As a linguist who speaks many languages, he is also well versed in the native Languages of Peru and Bolivia, speaking both Aymara and Quechua. In understanding the plight of immigrants from his home country and surrounding countries, specifically concerning the acquisition and usage of the English language, he quickly became a go-to ESL teacher/tutor for the Workforce Education Program here at the Latino Community Association, representing all of Central Oregon.

As a small boy, he would go down to the town center in La Paz, Bolivia to observe and listen to his Grandma and other townspeople share profound short stories that continue to be passed down generation to generation. His doctoral thesis was based on the landscape of Bolivia and how it affected the novel and short story. At 85 years of age, Reinaldo continues to write short stories and has the accredited version #104 of La Llorona, the legend of the wailing woman. His stories are always translated into Spanish and English and last year, he was invited to read his most recent story, *The Specter of Friar Clemente*, at the annual Día de Los Muertos event here at the Bend Latino Community Association.
